SPOTLIGHT ON STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS

Jonea Ahouissoussi is a Fourth year student from Centreville Virginia, majoring in Women, Gender and Sexuality and minoring in Sociology. She has dedicated much of her time and talents at UVA to supporting others through mentoring, and using her helping skills on Grounds and in the community.



As one of this year’s Student Co-Directors of Project RISE at UVA, she developed the Success At SEA program, created to help African-American fourth years’ transition successfully to post-graduate life. She is also an OAAA Peer Advisor, a member of the Black Student Alliance and the Steve Fund Youth Advisory Board, and the historian for the Organization of African Students.

Jonea is also very enthusiastic about advancing the rights of women and children in all aspects of society, including health-related causes. She spent her 2016 summer in Burkina Faso (West Africa), interning for the Permanent Interstate Committee for Drought Control in the Sahel, where she researched the impact of the lack of clean water on African women and children. Jonea plans to obtain a Masters Degree in Business Administration, and to work for a non-profit organization that specializes in helping women and children in African countries.

WEEK OF OCTOBER 31ST TO NOVEMBER 6TH

October 31, 1950 - Earl Lloyd Becomes the First African-American in NBA



Earl Lloyd, the first African-American to play in the National Basketball Association (NBA), ranks as a largely overlooked pioneer. Lloyd forged a path that is now profitably traveled by the NBA's legion of African-American stars. He walked a path that has since been traveled by Wilt Chamberlain, Bill Russell, Dave Bing, Michael Jordan and now, LeBron James and Amare Stoudemire. November 1, 1910 - W. E. B. Du Bois Begins Editing NAACP's "The Crisis" Magazine



W. E. B. Du Bois was one of the greatest African-Americans intellectuals in the twentieth century. The influence of his scholarship, advocacy for social justice and calls for equal rights for still resonate today. One of his important roles included editing the NAACP magazine, *The Crisis*, for 24 years. The first issue was dated November 1910. 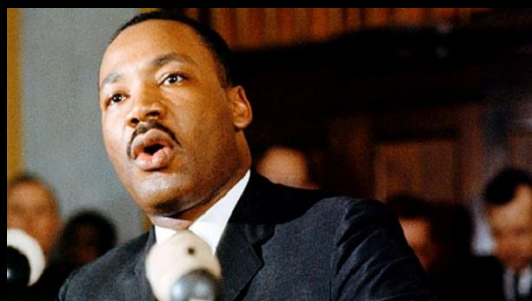

November 2, 1983 - Martin Luther King, Jr. Birthday Established as a National Holiday



On this day, President Ronald Reagan signed into law the bill making Martin Luther King's birthday a national holiday. Reagan, responding to right-wing and anti-civil rights pressure, had opposed the idea of a national holiday for King. But in the end, he signed it due to overwhelming public support. November 3, 1992 - First African-American Woman Elected to the United States Senate



Carol Elizabeth Moseley Braun, also sometimes Moseley-Braun (born August 16, 1947), is an American politician and lawyer, who represented Illinois in the United States Senate from 1993 to 1999. The goal is to encourage and assist high school students with college applications, financial aid, scholarship searches, and making the transition to post-secondary education.

November 4, 2008 - Barack Obama elected as America's first African-American President



In 2008, Senator Barack Obama of Illinois defeated Senator John McCain of Arizona to become the 44th U.S. president, and the first African-American elected to the White House. He garnered 365 electoral votes and nearly 53 percent of the popular vote, while his Republican opponent captured 173 electoral votes and more than 45 percent of the popular vote. November 5, 1968 - Shirley Chisholm Becomes the First African-American Woman Elected to the U.S. House of Representatives



Shirley Chisholm, a Democrat from Brooklyn, on this day became the first African-American woman elected to the House of Representatives. On January 25, 1972, she became the first African-American woman to seek the nomination for president by one of the two major political parties. She was also a founding member of both the Congressional Black Caucus (March 30, 1971) and National Women's Political Caucus (July 10, 1971). Chisholm served a total of 14 years in the Congress and made numerous contributions before she made retired in 1982.
