He led the Chicago Bulls to six National Basketball Association championships, and earned the NBA's Most Valuable Player Award five times.

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November 14, 1915 - Booker T. Washington Died



Booker T. Washington, one of the foremost teachers and 20th century African-American leaders, died at his home, near the Tuskegee Institute, AL (now University), which he founded and was President. Hardening of the arteries, following a nervous breakdown, caused his death four hours after Dr. Washington arrived from New York. His last public appearance was on October 25th at the National Conference of Congregational Churches in New York City, where he delivered a lecture. The funeral was held on the campus of Tuskegee Institute, where he is buried under a massive tree next to the university chapel.

November 17, 1955 - Civil Rights Bloc Formed in Congress



Rev. Adam Clayton Powell, Democrat from Harlem and the leading African-American in Congress, on this day announced the formation of an “organized civil rights bloc” in Congress. The event marked the beginning of a civil rights caucus that eventually led to the formal organization of the Congressional Black Caucus, on March 30, 1971. Civil rights groups had already organized the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, on January 8, 1950, to lobby for civil rights legislation. Rep. Powell’s move was prompted by the Supreme Court’s *Brown v. Board of Education* decision on May 17, 1954.

November 18, 1964 - FBI Director Hoover Calls Martin Luther King the "Most Notorious Liar"



FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover made headlines by calling Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. the "most notorious liar in the country." Hoover made the comment in front of a group of female journalists ahead of King's trip to Oslo, Norway, where he received the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize. November 20, 1923 - Garrett Morgan Patents Three-Position Traffic Signal



The U.S. Patent Office grants Patent No. 1,475,074 to 46-year-old inventor and newspaperman Garrett Morgan for his three-position traffic signal. Although Morgan's was not the first traffic signal

(one had been installed in London in 1868), it was still an important innovation.
