QUOTE'S CORNER: Marian Anderson

Marian Anderson (February 27, 1897 – April 8, 1993) was an American contralto and one of the

most celebrated singers of the twentieth century. She became an important figure in the struggle for black artists to overcome racial prejudice in the United States. In 1939, the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) refused permission for her to sing to an integrated audience in Constitution Hall. In Washington DC. Instead, she performed a concert on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. The incident placed her into the spotlight of the international community. She continued to break barriers for African-American artists, performing at the Metropolitan Opera in New York City on January 7, 1955

THIS WEEK IN BLACK HISTORY

September 12th 1977 - Steven Biko's Death



Steven Bantu Biko born in 1946, was the most influential anti-apartheid leader of the 1970s. Dies of severe head trauma on the stone floor of a prison cell in Pretoria. Six days earlier, he had suffered a major blow to his skull during a police interrogation in Port Elizabeth. Instead of receiving medical attention, he was chained spread-eagled to a window grill for 24 hours. On September 11, he was dumped, naked and shackled, on the floor of a police vehicle and driven 740 miles to Pretoria Central Prison. He died the next day. September 13th 1936 - Bob Feller strikes out 17 at 17



On September 13, Feller started the first game of a double-header against the Philadelphia A's at League Park in Cleveland. The young pitcher's fastball was effective from the start and he was soon racking up strikes at a pace unseen in the American League since Rube Waddell of the St. Louis Browns struck out 16 batters in 1908. Feller's 17

Strikeouts that day tied Dizzy Dean's modern major league record, set in 1933. Two years later, on the last day of the 1938 season, Feller broke Dean's record when he struck out 18 Detroit Tigers, setting a modern record that would stand for 31 years. September 15th 1963 - Birmingham Church Bombing



On September 15, 1963, a bomb exploded during Sunday morning services in the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama, killing four young girls. With its large African-American congregation, the 16th Street Baptist Church served as a meeting place for civil rights activities. Fifteen sticks of dynamite were planted in the church basement, underneath what turned out to be the girls' restroom. The bomb detonated at 10:19 a.m., killing Cynthia Wesley, Carole Robertson and Addie Mae Collins—all 14 years old—and 11-year-old Denise McNair. Spike Lee's film, *Four Little Girls*, depicts this true story.

September 17th 1983 - Vanessa Williams becomes first black Miss America



Vanessa Lynn Williams was born on March 18, 1963, and raised by music-teacher parents in suburban New York City. She attended Syracuse University, where she majored in musical theater. After winning the Miss New York title, Williams went to Atlantic City, New Jersey, to participate in the Miss America pageant. On September 17, 1983, Williams made history by becoming the first African-American woman in the pageant's 63-year history to capture the Miss America title. (For the competition's first 30 years, blacks weren't even allowed to become contestants.) Scandal later erupted, however, when nude photos surfaced of Williams that had reportedly been shot when she worked for a photographer before her pageant days. She was forced to resign her Miss America title in July 1984. The photos later appeared (without Williams' consent) in *Penthouse* magazine. The fellowship offers exceptional Americans first-hand experience working at the highest levels of the Federal government. After a competitive application process, selected individuals spend a year in Washington, DC working as a full-time, paid Fellow to Cabinet Secretaries, senior White House staff, and other top-ranking government officials. Fellows also participate in an education program consisting of roundtable discussions with renowned leaders from the private and public sectors. Fellowships are awarded on a strictly non-partisan basis.

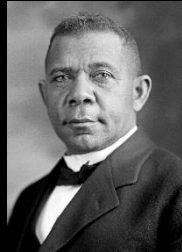
September 17th 1866 - Mary Burnett Talbert was born



Mary Burnett Talbert (September 17, 1866 – October 15, 1923), an American orator, activist, suffragist and reformer, was born. Called "the best known Colored Woman in the United States," Talbert was among the most prominent African Americans of her time. She used her education and energies to promote anti-lynching and anti-racism work. Talbert also supported women's suffrage and in 1915, she spoke at the "Votes for Women: A Symposium by Leading Thinkers of Colored Women" in Washington, D.C. During her national and international lecture tours, she educated audiences about oppressive conditions in African-American communities and the need for legislation to address these conditions. She was instrumental in gaining a voice for African-American women in international women's organizations. As a founder of the Niagara Movement, Talbert helped to launch organized civil rights activism in America.

On September 18, 1895, at the Atlanta Exposition, Booker T. Washington rises to national fame when he delivers what came to be known as his "Atlanta Compromise" speech, in which he advocates for the races to work together while remaining separate socially.
