QUOTE'S CORNER: Malcolm X

Malcolm X was an African-American minister and human rights activist. To his admirers, he was a courageous advocate for the rights of blacks, who

challenged America in the harshest terms for its crimes against Blacks. Detractors accused him of preaching racism and violence. A devout minister in the Nation of Islam, he traveled to Africa and the Middle East, and co sacred pilgrimage -- the Hajj. Returning to the USA, he repudiated the Nation of Islam, disavowed racism and founded Muslim Mosque, Inc. and the Organization of Afro-American Unity. He continued to emphasize Pan-Africanism, Black self-determination, and Black self-defense. In February 1965, he was assassinated by three members of the Nation of Islam during a speaking engagement in New York City.

THIS WEEK IN BLACK HISTORY WEEK OF OCTOBER 3RD TO OCTOBER 9TH

October 3rd, 1995 - O.J. Simpson was acquitted



At the end of a sensational trial, former football star O.J. Simpson is acquitted of the brutal 1994 double murder of his estranged wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend, Ronald Goldman. In the epic 252-day trial, Simpson's "dream team" of lawyers employed creative and controversial methods to convince jurors that Simpson's guilt had not been proved "beyond a reasonable doubt," thus surmounting what the prosecution called a "mountain of evidence" implicating him as the murderer.

Legendary blues singer Bessie Smith is buried near Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on October 4, 1937. Some 7,000 mourners attended her funeral. Smith had been killed a few days before when the old Packard in which she was driving hit a parked truck near Coahoma, Mississippi.

Islamic extremists assassinated Anwar Sadat, the president of Egypt, on the anniversary of the Yom Kippur War. October 8th, 2004 - First Black Woman Wins a Nobel Peace Prize



Kenyan ecologist Wangari Maathai, 64, was honored by the Nobel committee for standing at the "front of the fight to promote ecologically viable social, economic and cultural development in Kenya and in Africa." She is an outspoken environmentalist, whose tree-planting campaign have slowed deforestation and aid the poor.

Applicants must be a full time undergraduate students at UVa and remain enrolled at the University through the completion of the funded event. Grant awardees will be required to meet with Brian Cullaty, Director of Undergraduate Research Opportunities at the Center for Undergraduate Excellence, and Edith Conti, Office Manager at the Center for Undergraduate Excellence, prior to departure. **Applications will be considered on a rolling basis. Funds must be used for events occurring before April 1, 2017.**

Civil rights leader and two-time Democratic presidential candidate Jesse Jackson rose to prominence working within Martin Luther King Jr.'s Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). He was at the Memphis hotel with Dr. King when he was assassinated.
