QUOTE'S CORNER: Ralph Ellison



Ralph Ellison

Ellison (March 1, 1914-April 16, 1994) was American writer who won eminence with his first novel, the *Invisible Man* in 1952. It was

his only novel that was published during his lifetime. Another novel, *Flying Home and Other Stories*, was published posthumously in 1996. He left a second novel unfinished at his death; it was published, in a much-shortened form, as *Juneteenth* in 1999. Ellison also published two collections of essays: *Shadow and Act* (1964) and *Going to the Territory* (1986). He lectured widely on black culture, folklore, and creative writing. He also taught at various colleges and universities in the United States.

THIS WEEK IN BLACK HISTORY

WEEK OF MARCH 20TH – 26TH

March 20, 1912 - Carter G. Woodson received a doctorate from Harvard University. He became the second African-American to do so (WEB DuBois was the first). Woodson was born in 1875 in New Canton, Virginia. He began high school in his late teens and was an excellent student who completed a four-year course



of study in less than two years. After attending Berea College in Kentucky, Woodson earned his bachelor and masters degrees from the University of Chicago. Then, Woodson dedicated his life to the study of African-American history, with a goal that the subject be taught in all schools throughout the United States and studied by scholars. For his efforts, Woodson is often called the "Father of Black History." He lobbied extensively to establish Negro History Week (which later became Black History Month), as a nationwide observance and wrote many historical works, including the 1933 book, *The Mis-Education of the Negro*. From his Washington DC home, he directed the operations of the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) and the Associated Publishers, a publishing company. He died in 1950. March 21, 1921 – Eva Beatrice Dykes was the first African-American woman to fulfill the requirements for a doctoral degree. Born in Washington, DC on



August 13, 1893, she attended Howard University, graduating summa cum laude with a B.A. in 1914. While attending Howard, Eva was initiated into the Alpha chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. Dykes later attended Radcliffe College, graduating magna cum laude with a second BA in 1917, and an MA in 1918. At Radcliffe, she was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. In 1920, Dykes began teaching at Dunbar High School in the nation's capital, returning to Howard in 1929 as a member of the English Faculty. In 1944, she joined the English faculty of the Seventh-day Adventist Oakwood College in Huntsville (AL), as the first staff member to hold a doctoral degree. Before retiring in 1968, she was instrumental in helping Oakwood gain accreditation. On March 25, 1965, Martin Luther King, Jr. led thousands of nonviolent demonstrators to the steps of the capitol in Montgomery, Alabama.
