Ursula M. Burns

Ursula M. Burns (born September 20, 1958) serves as Chairwoman (since May 2010) of Xerox and was the CEO of the company from July 2009 to December 2016. As

such, she was the first black-American woman CEO to head a Fortune 500 company. She is also the first woman to succeed another woman as head of a Fortune 500 company, having succeeded Anne Mulcahy as CEO of Xerox. THIS WEEK IN BLACK HISTORY WEEK OF APRIL 10TH – 16TH



April 11, 1881 - Spelman College was founded in Atlanta, GA. Originally named the Atlanta Baptist Female Seminary, it was one of the first institutes of higher education for African-American women in the United States. Spelman was the 4th historically black female institution

of higher education to receive its collegiate charter in 1924, and today is ranked consistently among the nation's top liberal arts colleges. **For more information visit:** <http://www.spelman.edu/about-us>



April 12, 1864 - Fort Pillow (TN) Massacre in which an estimated 300 black soldiers were killed – Confederates constructed a military installation during the American Civil War at the Fort Pillow site and named it for General Gideon Johnson Pillow (1806-78), a Tennessee native. Fort Pillow overlooked the Mississippi River and was an important part of the Confederate river defense system. Once captured by federal forces, Confederate troops led by General Nathan Bedford Forrest re-captured the site from Union troops. Although most of the Union garrison surrendered, historical accounts state that many black soldiers were massacred, instead of being allowed to be taken as prisoners-of-war.
