Martin Luther King Jr. (January 15, 1929 - April 4, 1968) was an American Baptist minister and activist who was a leader in the African-

American Civil Rights Movement. King led the 1955 Montgomery

boycott and

found

bus helped the Southern LKJ Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) in

1957, serving as its first president. King also helped

to organize the 1963 March on Washington, where he delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" speech. King helped to organize the Selma-to Montgomery marches in 1965. He was planning a national occupation of Washington, D.C., to be called the Poor People's Campaign in 1968, when he was assassinated on April 4 in Memphis, Tennessee.

September 20th, 1830 - First National Black Convention Meets

First National Black Convention met at Philadelphia's Bethel AME church and elected Richard Allen president. Thirty-eight delegates from eight states attended this first national meeting. **Visit:** http://www.blackfacts.com/search/9/20 to learn more.

September $21^{\rm st}$ 1872 - John Henry Conyers of South Carolina became the first African American admitted to the United States Naval Academy

Conyers was nominated by South Carolina congressman Robert B. Elliott. After his arrival, he was shunned and harassed constantly, including receiving severe, ongoing hazing, verbal torment and beatings. News of this behavior leaked to the newspapers, and a three-man board was convened to investigate the attacks. The board concluded that "His persecutors are left then without any excuse or palliation except the inadmissible one of prejudice." Eventually, some classmates were dismissed from the Academy. Conyers resigned his commission in October 1873. **Visit:**

September 21st 1998 - Florence Griffith Joyner died



Florence Griffith Joyner (December 21, 1959 – September 21, 1998), known as Flo-Jo, was a USA track and field athlete and considered the fastest woman of all time. In 1986, she set world records in the 100 meter and 200 meter distance races that still stand (and have yet to be seriously challenged). In the 1988 Seoul Olympic Games, Griffith became the first American woman to win four track and field medals — three gold and one silver — in one Olympic competition. Her career was cut short tragically when she died in her sleep, as the result of an epileptic seizure (at the age of 38).

September 22nd 1862 – President Abraham Lincoln issues the Emancipation Proclamation



On September 22, 1862, following the Union "victory" at the Battle of Antietam, the Preliminary Emancipation Proclamation was issued, to be effective three months later on January 1, 1863. The Emancipation had an immediate and profound effect with strong reactions. The Proclamation also allowed for African-Americans to join the Union's armed forces. By the end of the war, nearly 200,000 would honorably serve. Initially, the Proclamation applied to the states in rebellion. It paved the way for the 13th Amendment, adopted on December 6, 1865, which officially abolished slavery in the United States. September 23rd, 1930 - Ray Charles was born



Ray Charles Robinson (September 23, 1930 – June 10, 2004), known professionally as Ray Charles, was an American singer, songwriter, musician, and composer. Blind from the age of seven, he pioneered the genre of soul music during the 1950s by combining blues, rhythm and blues, and gospel styles into the music he recorded. He was one of the first African-American musicians to be granted artistic control by a mainstream record company.

In 2004, Rolling Stone ranked Charles at number ten on their list of the "100 Greatest Artists of All Time", and number two on their November 2008 list of the "100 Greatest Singers of All Time". Billy Joel observed: "This may sound like sacrilege, but I think Ray Charles was more important than Elvis Presley"

September 24th, 1825 - Frances Watkins Harper, writer born



Frances Ellen Watkins Harper was born in Baltimore Maryland, to free black parents who died when she was three years old. At age 13, she did domestic work for a family who let her use their library. Soon she began to write her own poetry and in 1854 her collection of verse and prose, Forest Leaves, was published. She became involved in the anti-slavery movement, and was an effective speaker who could draw large audiences. In 1859, she became the first Black American to publish a short story, "The Two Officers." Her novel, lola Leroy or Shadows Uplifted, which was published in 1892, made her the second Black woman to have a novel published in the United States Visit:

This grant provides funding to undergraduates for travel, lodging, and meals related to a research conference or workshop. This event may be at another institution, but the grant will only apply to domestic travel. Approximately 2-3 awards of up to \$300 are granted on a competitive basis. Applicants must be a fulltime undergraduate students at U.Va. and must remain enrolled at the University through the completion of the funded event. Workshop or conference attendees will be reimbursed for their expenses following the event. Grant awardees will be required to meet with Brian Cullaty, Director of Undergraduate Research Opportunities at the Center for Undergraduate Excellence, and Edith Conti, Office Manager at the Center for Undergraduate Excellence, prior to departure.
